California Public Records Act Clean-Up: Stakeholder Outreach

The Commission,¹ based on direction from the Legislature,² has recently commenced the study of a nonsubstantive clean-up of the California Public Records Act ("CPRA")³ and related provisions.

The Commission has previously directed the staff, when any new study is initiated, to provide the Commission with information about stakeholders who may be participating in the study:

When inviting stakeholder participation in a new study, the staff should provide Commissioners with a list of the groups and individuals that were invited to participate.⁴

In the staff memorandum introducing this study, the staff reported it had not yet begun building a mailing list for the study, as the Commission had not previously done work on this topic and therefore had no pre-existing mailing list to use as a base.⁵

The staff has since begun work on establishing a mailing list for the study, having invited approximately 65 entities and individuals to participate in the study.⁶ As always, anyone is welcome to participate in the Commission's study, regardless of whether the staff has contacted them about participating.

The list of invitees is attached as an exhibit to this memorandum. It includes a number of entities or representative organizations that typically make public records requests. This group includes newspaper and journalist organizations, as well as advocacy organizations with a special focus on transparency in

government. It also includes some entities that deal primarily with consumer rights, tort reform, criminal justice, or firearm issues.

The list also includes many organizations that primarily receive public records requests. This group includes organizations representing California counties, cities, and special districts, public universities and colleges, as well as organizations representing school boards, public utilities, prosecutors, and public defenders.

The list also includes many entities that represent public employees, such as peace officers, correctional officers, public officials, prosecutors, defense attorneys, firefighters, and teachers.

In addition, the list includes entities that publicly expressed views on Proposition 42, a 2014 constitutional initiative on public access to local government records.

Finally, the list includes the Attorney General's office, a legal scholar who has been a Commission consultant in the past, and the two legislative committees likely to be assigned a bill that would implement a Commission recommendation in the study.

The staff welcomes any suggestions of additional persons who should be invited to participate in this study.
