

FIRST SUPPLEMENT TO MEMORANDUM 2024-5

Antitrust Law: Status Report

UPDATE TO PROPOSED SCHEDULE

The staff has received a request from Group 1 – Single Firm Conduct to present their expert report to the Commission at its March 21, 2024, meeting instead of the April 18, 2024, meeting. Originally, Memorandum 2024-5 had proposed that Group 7 – Concentration in California would present their expert report at the April 18, 2024, meeting.¹ Group 7 has indicated that this proposed schedule change will work for the group. With the change, the schedule for the March and April meetings would be:

- March 21, 2024, 9:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.: Hybrid meeting.
Single Firm Conduct
- April 18, 2024, 9:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.: In-person meeting Sacramento.
Concentration in California

The staff has shared the proposed schedule with all the expert group liaisons. At this point, this is the only request to modify the proposed schedule that the staff has received from the groups.

PUBLIC COMMENT

The staff has received a couple of questions about the ability to submit written public comment for consideration on a specific topic if the commenter is unable to submit written comment in advance of the meeting when the Commission will hear the relevant expert report according to the proposed schedule. As a practice, the Commission welcomes written comments at any time during its study process. The proposed schedule provides an opportunity for the Commission to hear from the various expert groups, as well as to receive and hear public comments on the subjects on the agenda. However, the meetings where expert groups present will not be the only opportunity for the
